# The Times We Are In – Addition to the CUPE National Equality Statement – LSW

We are living in times where it is more important than ever to uphold our CUPE National Equality Statement and Code of Conduct, and not condone nor tolerate behavior that undermines the dignity or self-esteem of any individual. CUPE 951 creates a safe space for our meetings by following our Equality Statement and Code of Conduct during our time together. We are seeing increasing visibility of white supremacist groups, anti-Indigenous

and Black racism, and discrimination towards racialized, marginalized, 2SLGBTQI+ and other equity deserving groups. Open expressions of hate of all kinds are becoming more common. #### 8. Executive Board Report – PDW

The executive board met on April 3, 2024 and we also had a special meeting on March 13 to discuss new directives from CUPE National in regards to virtual and hybrid meetings where secret ballots are required. Kirk agreed we needed a demo of the suggested platform before we could decide how to proceed.

We continued the discussion around the new voting requirements in the April meeting. The primary issue is that we are no longer authorized to use zoom polls for secret ballots and while we could use Simply Voting, it is costly and would change how we manage elections, requiring a full revision of our election bylaws. We were unable to schedule a demo of the suggested platform (Motion Meetings) so to ensure we do not risk having our elections invalidated due to errors in process, we voted to hold the May general meeting in <u>person ONLY</u>.

# MOTION: That CUPE 951 host an in-person only May 29th meeting for the purpose of the Executive elections – MSCarried

Our internal communications setup continues; Kirk spent time on Good Friday with Think Communications getting our email moved to a new Microsoft Server; this caused some unexpected domains to fail, and we have had to move all new emails over to the new server. Kirk is looking into whether this new set up allows us to have a 951 only Teams set up instead of discussing labour issues on UVic Servers. [We later discovered that this also impacted our mailing list]

Kirk updated us on the Day of Mourning event being cosponsored by Victoria Labour Council and CUPE 2081 at Camosun College (Lansdowne) on Sunday April 28th. Kirk is hoping that Nykita and Amy will be able to attend.

Ahead of convention, CUPE BC sent out a survey of top five picks out of each resolution category to help prioritize which resolutions take precedence. The deadline is April 9th.

CUPE 3903 at York University requested financial support. Their local is academic teaching assistants, equivalent to CUPE 4163 here. Our Bylaws allow for a donation up to \$500 to be passed by the Executive as it is for support of a CUPE local.

# Motion: That CUPE 951 support CUPE Local 3903 (at York University) financially with a donation of \$500 and a letter of support – MSCarried

Teresa raised the issue that the inability of the local to access the Childcare Top Up (a fund provided by the Provincial Government) when workers are doing work for the Union makes it a significant disincentive for volunteers.

Education motion in regard to SuperCon, a conference in Kelowna, there is a small window for applications, so the following motion was made and it was agreed to canvas executive and stewards for interest first:

MOTION: that CUPE 951 send up to 2 members to SuperCon June 18th-20th in Kelowna – MSCarried

Other upcoming and suggested education opportunities were also discussed. Reports were received from the President and Head Steward The meeting adjourned at 1:02 pm.

#### 9. President's Report – KM

Welcome, friends!

On April 3rd, I met with HR to discuss the Centralized IT project, which involves Systems taking back under their portfolio IT staff working in multiple departments across the campus. I have asked for a new organization chart to show that IT support will still work in those departments as they review all those positions over the next year. I was assured that none of these positions would be affected by the budget reductions announced in February.

On April 8th, our agreement study committee met for a second time to go over any research on other collective agreement language for CUPE locals in the same sector and other large employer groups. So far, the group is working on drafting some new changes to the existing language. We look forward to having a good report to pass on to the negotiation committee in September.

On April 16th, I have a follow-up meeting with the larger solidarity network that includes union leadership from Royal Roads University, Camosun College, Vancouver Island University, and North Island College. We all talked about the budget reductions and that the Uvic FA and UVSS will meet with Miniter Beare on April 22. CUPE 4163 will likely see the most jobs cut as they are seen to be doing 50% of the instruction on campus.

On April 18th, I will meet with the UVic Solidarity Group. We will be completing a letter to Premier Eby and Minister Beare on postsecondary funding.

The **Coast Salish** is a group of ethnically and linguistically related <u>Indigenous peoples of the Pacific Northwest Coast</u>, living in <u>British Columbia</u>, Canada and the <u>U.S.</u> states of <u>Washington</u> and <u>Oregon</u>. They speak one of the <u>Coast Salish languages</u>.

The Coast Salish are a large, loose grouping of many tribes with numerous distinct cultures and languages. Territory claimed by Coast Salish peoples span from the northern limit of the <u>Salish Sea</u> (aka <u>Strait of Georgia</u>) on the inside of <u>Vancouver Island</u> and covers most of southern Vancouver Island, all of the <u>Lower Mainland</u> and most of <u>Puget Sound</u> and the <u>Olympic Peninsula</u>
